It is very exciting that this year's banquet will honor our alumni! Specifically, the evening will recognize seven alumni — one representing each of our school's seven decades — who have chosen to live in Memphis and work toward helping build

the school and the community. While we are spotlighting seven individuals, we really are honoring all of you: our distinguished alumni.


There are many ways you can participate in this year's banquet. The details are outlined on page 28. We look forward to hearing from you and hope all of you will participate in some way to ensure this year's banquet is a big success.

A series of events that occurred since our last issue has reinforced in my mind the unique and extraordinary qualities of the Memphis Jewish community and our MHA/FYOS alumni in particular. In early February, Memphis experienced an ice storm, which knocked out power across much of the city. Many of you still remember the ice storm of 1994, during which our area was without power for 10 days. This one was slightly shorter — lasting about a week — but just as traumatic for those of us left in the dark. The frigid temperatures on those first few days made it difficult and quite dangerous for people without power to remain in their homes. Interestingly, small pockets of houses in our neighborhood, at seemingly random intervals, did not lose power. True to the reputation of Southern hospitality, those with lights and heat looked past the challenging conditions and opened their homes

and hearts to those who didn't. In some cases, four or five families shared a single-family home. Baron Hirsch Congregation, the only synagogue in the neighborhood that had power, kept its doors open each day so community members could come in, warm up, and charge their devices. The shul even hosted MHA/FYOS classes for a couple of days until power was restored to our school campus. As stressful as that time was, I can't imagine going through it anywhere else but here, where the chesed (loving kindness) flows like melting ice.

Those who read our newsletter faithfully can affirm that people frequently comment on the fact that friends made at this school are friends for life. I watched examples of this unfold before me in real time these past few months.

Since the release of our last issue, we unfortunately lost two beloved members of the MHA/FYOS alumni family. (This newsletter is dedicated in their memory; see page 2.) Dec. 5 marked the passing of **Marty LeVine**, z'I (MHA '77, YOS '81). It's hard to imagine that one could live in our community and not know Marty. He was a ray of sunshine who shared a smile with everyone he met. After his passing, a






Marty LeVine z'/(MHA '77, YOS '81), in eighth grade and 2021

Our school's new Mary Pikelny STEAM Center, located in the



The Beauty of Struggle

The exodus from *Mitzrayim* (Egypt) that we commemorate on Pesach is often regarded as the starting point for *Am Yisrael* — the nation of Israel. Our people came to fruition as a result of devastating hardships and oppression by a tyrannical, abusive Pharaoh. His initial expectations of the Jews were, on the whole, somewhat reasonable; over time, he began physically torturing the Jewish slaves and overworking them, giving them labor quotas that were nearly impossible to reach. Finally, Hashem decided enough was enough; the Jews needed to be set free. He struck Egypt with 10 plagues, split the sea, and brought the Jews to the desert. There, they wandered for 40 years, before finally reaching the promised land of Israel.

Why all the hardships? What was Hashem's point in forcing us to be slaves in Egypt for so long? The conditions in Egypt were unbearable, yet our ancestors had to endure them for so many years. Couldn't Hashem have helped us escape sooner? Surely, He had the power to do so at any time.

In "Rocky Balboa," the sixth film in the Rocky series (not the best movie, but it did include this amazing quote), the title character says about life, "It ain't about how hard you hit; it's about how hard you can get hit and keep moving forward." We, as Jews, know why being able to "take a hit" is important. That resilience is what's kept us around for so many years. We've seen many empires rise and fall throughout history, yet we are the ones who are still around.

Slavery in Egypt was just the start of the many hits we've had to take throughout our nation's history. We survived the Spanish Inquisition, the Crusades, the Purim story, the Chanukah story and even the Holocaust. Clearly, Jews have gone through more than our fair share of tough times. What are we supposed to learn from all of this oppression? Why would Hashem, a loving G-d, force us to endure such hardships?

Perhaps the answer is this: Through struggle and adversity, a person can really grow. As former college football coach Lou Holtz famously said, "In this world, you're either growing or you're dying, so get in motion and grow." When you spend a long time trying to understand something and you really work through it, you gain a richer appreciation of the concept than if someone had just given you the answer. If you go to the gym day after day and push yourself until your body can't lift anymore, that is when you grow muscle. Many who survive very tough circumstances and even near-death experiences ultimately become closer to Hashem. So too with the Jews in *Mitzrayim*, whose struggles enabled them to develop into Hashem's chosen nation and to become the wonderful people we are today.

If you're ever going through something very difficult in life, remember that Hashem is making it happen for a reason. Instead of seeing it as a misfortune, consider trying to view it as an opportunity for growth that's meant to show you who you really are and who you can become.





Rosenthal was honored with the international Gitelson Medallion for Jewish leadership and service and a global AEPi achievement award.

Regrettably, Rosenthal has been battling a progressive and as-yet undiagnosed illness for several years, putting his post-college plans on hold. "While I may not be able to find much relief for myself, I can still have a positive impact on others' lives by starting some charity projects," he said.



"It costs nothing to be kind, and one kind word might just spark a match when someone is surrounded by darkness. Sometimes the smiles on people's faces are really masking inner turmoil and struggle. We must counter the sadness and hate in the world with acts of kindness, *tzedakah* and *mitzvot*. We all possess the tools to commit to *tikkun olam* – repairing the world."

At the CYHSB steak dinner in 2016, Rosenthal sang an original song he wrote about his time at our school. (The lyrics can be found on page 22 of this issue.) "While the performance was only a few minutes long, it is a memory that will stay with me for a lifetime," he said.

"I am thankful to so many teachers and rabbis who taught me not only so much in academics, but about life as well," he said. "You have my everlasting thanks and gratitude."







Teaching history, inspiring a bright future

Whitney Kennon never set out to be a high school teacher, let alone a principal. A lifelong lover of history, she pursued a Ph.D. in medieval and Renaissance history and presumed she would follow the standard career path for her graduate program and become a college professor.

As she neared completion of her Ph.D. around 2006, her mentor suggested that she take some job interviews with local high schools as preparation for interviews for college-level positions. Taking his advice, she interviewed for a history teacher position at a private school, was offered the job, and turned it down. Her interviewer, however disappointed, passed her name along to Mrs. Anat Kampf, who was then principal of the GMSG and looking to hire a history teacher. Kennon (who, prior to her wedding and degree conferral, was known as Ms. Huey) came to interview for the FYOS job with no intention of taking it.

"Something about the school drew me in, and I decided to give it a chance," Kennon said of accepting Kampf's offer. "I like that it's a religious school with a purpose and a strong sense of the kind of honest, well-rounded student it's looking to produce. The small community here is more like a family, and I love that. I'm still here, many years later, and I believe it's where I'm supposed to be."

Kennon has taught world history (her personal favorite), American history and art history, including at the honors and Advanced Placement (AP) level, in the boys' and girls' high schools. She became such a popular teacher that the school invited her to teach in the junior high school at well. "I had no experience with that age group, but I ended up really loving the opportunity to teach them," she said.

"Dr. Kennon is an excellent history teacher who is the best at keeping the topic at hand interesting," said **Benjamin Siegel** (MHA '18, soon-to-be FYOS '22). "I've always looked forward to her AP U.S. history class. Thank you, Dr. Kennon, for all you have done for me and my classmates."

"Dr. Kennon was one of my favorite teachers," said **Esti Samberg** (MHA '16, FYOS '20). "She added so much positivity to the hallways of our school, always greeting everyone with a smile and her favorite saying: 'Happy daisies!'"

No matter the age of her history students, Kennon always seeks to convey more than what happened years ago. "I want to teach my students how to be good citizens, so they're prepared for the world when they step outside of their bubble," she said. "History gives us an understanding of other peoples and cultures. If our students want to be respected

as Jews, they need to know what's going on in the world and how to respect others. I know that not everyone will love studying history, but I at least want my students to appreciate its importance and relevance to the world today."

Noga Finkelstein (MHA '12, FYOS '16), who was born in Israel, became a U.S. citizen while taking Kennon's AP U.S. history class in 2016. Kennon proudly took the class to the immigration office to celebrate the occasion and made it a memorable lesson on the meaning of citizenship.

In 2019, Kennon was offered the opportunity to serve as general studies principal of both high schools. "History is my first love, and I didn't want the job if I wasn't going to be able to teach," she said. She's arranged to continue working in the

classroom as a history teacher, while carrying out administrative duties like overseeing the general studies curriculum, ensuring students meet all state and school requirements for graduation, scheduling events, hiring teachers and more.

Through the years, Kennon has developed close relationships with the dozens of students impacted by her hard work at the school. Many of those bonds have been forged outside the classroom — whether during one-on-one chats in her office, on school trips she's chaperoned or at the Jewish community programs she makes a point to attend.

"On our fall trip my senior year, a few of us were on a raft with Dr. Kennon with no current for about six hours," recalled **Yehudit Fleischhacker** (MHA '13, FYOS '17). "While all the other rafts on the trip lost all morale and energy, Dr. Kennon was cracking jokes, snagging some extra snacks for us, and even helped carry the raft. She also made our AP art history class matching bucket hats when they came into trend with the words 'art history is swell' embroidered on them. Not only does the hat remind me of the swell times we had in her class, but it will keep me protected the next time I'm stuck in a current-less river!"

Kennon's tireless efforts have not gone unnoticed; in 2012, the CYHSB recognized her as the honoree at their annual steak dinner, and the GMSG honored her at their gala dinner in 2019. To commemorate the latter occasion, every GMSG student penned a letter of gratitude for Kennon.





"Whether a student got into an Ivy School university or went to visit a museum, I feel like I'm winning if something I did stuck with them," she said. "Every one of my students has a gift, and I want them to find it and do something worthwhile with it. It makes me so happy when they reach out to tell me how they're doing and how well they've turned out."
