wife, Jodilyn, and our teenage son, Jeffrey, join me here in Memphis, while our daughter, Julia, attends Stern College in New York City.

In our short time in Memphis, my family and I have experienced some of the outstand-

ing traits that the community offers: a broad landscape of Jewish institutions, warmth (both social and meteorological), accessible Torah scholars and a rich Jewish memory.

I intentionally use the word memory in lieu of a similar word, history. History describes what happened and is a cold and dispassionate record of past events. Memory has no such constraint. It is a perspective. It describes what is experienced. Because it is dependent upon the individual's awareness, memory is alive. Memphis has a living and breathing Jewish memory.

Our *mitzvot* are oriented toward memory over history. As the Torah tells us, *zachor et yom hashabbat lekadsho* – remember the Shabbat

day to sanctify it. Lema'an tizkor et yom tzetcha me'eretz mitzrayim – in order that you will remember the day of your exodus from Egypt. Zachor et asher asa lecha amalek – remember what Amalek did to you. By prompting us to relive our national memory, these mitzvot cause us to reconnect with our nation's ideals and to forge ties with our fellow Jews.

Alumni of the MHA/FYOS are a critical part of the school's memory, not only its history. The MHA/FYOS of today is shaped by the influence of those who previously walked its halls.

> Our alumni are now MHA/ FYOS teachers, parents and board members. Our alumni are dedicated MHA/FYOS volunteers and make the school a priority when donating time and money. Today's MHA/FYOS

students are strongly affected by the impact you made yesterday and that you continue to make today.

As we enter a new school year and a new Jewish year, I hope that you will reflect on your MHA/FYOS memories and contribute to memory-building for the next MHA/FYOS generation. I also hope that you will help me settle into my new position by contacting me and sharing some of your favorite memories from your time at the MHA/FYOS.

D'VAR TORAH

The story is told of a king who would travel on occasion to convene town hall meetings throughout his provinces. He was, in earnest, interested in what his subjects had to say and to entertain their concerns. One of his scheduled meetings was to take place at a particular location at a particular time one evening. Great excitement was generated by the populace as they anxiously awaited the arrival of his majesty. As scheduling would have it, the king and his entourage were running late — sev-

eral hours late, in fact. One individual became impatient and returned home, planning to join the meeting when the king would eventually arrive. When he got home, he fell asleep, missing the town meeting altogether. He awoke the next morning feeling distraught and journeyed to the king's palace to arrange a personal meeting and share the concerns he

intended to express the night before. Upon reaching the regal gates and sharing his story with one of the palace officers, he was told that not only would it be impossible to meet the king, but that the royal secretary would not even relay his message. Why? Because he had shown blatant disregard for the king's

honor by leaving the assemblage, returning home and refusing to expend the effort to personally greet the king.

The saintly *Chofetz Chaim*, of blessed memory, tells us that while it is true that Hashem is accessible to each of us anytime throughout the course of the year, we may lose our access if we blatantly show Him a lack of respect by failing to greet Him when He "comes to town" to visit with us. This is where we find

ourselves at the present time. The period beginning with the Hebrew month of *Elul* and continuing through Yom Kippur is referred to as y'mei haratzon, or days of goodwill. It cuts both ways, says the Sfas Emes: if we create within ourselves the will to forge a relationship with Hashem, then He will respond in

kind and more than reciprocate. He will demonstrate his unbridled love for us and bestow His bountiful blessings upon us.

Let us not squander the opportunity. Let us not "sleep through" the event. In fact, throughout the month of *Elul* and on Rosh

Hashanah, the *shofar* is sounded for the purpose of awakening us from our slumber. Hashem craves a relationship with each and every one of us; let us not let Him down.

Hashem's kingship on Rosh Hashanah is manifested most acutely when we, His chosen people, relate to one another with a sense of achdus, or unity and brotherly love. I believe that the noble enterprise of unity has been the crowning jewel of the school now known as the Margolin Hebrew Academy since its very inception. This precious institution has always stood out in my mind as a model for all day schools to follow.

May Hashem continue to shower His *brachos* (blessings) on this wonderful school, and may

we all be inscribed in the book of good life and prosperity.

We wish Rabbi Kutner continued good health until 120!





On March 24, 2015, the MHA/FYOS family suffered a great loss with the passing of Mrs. Emily Morris Krohn at the age of 91. Krohn began working at the Academy in the late 1950s as a kindergarten teacher and later served as the school's assistant principal.

Born in Nashville in 1924, Emily Morris earned a degree from the Peabody College of Education and Human Development, which is now part of Vanderbilt University. At the age of 20, she wed Karl Krohn, to whom she would be married for 70 years, until his passing just six weeks before her own. The Krohns settled in Memphis in 1952, and she joined the faculty at the MHA shortly thereafter.

"My mother was honored to work at the Academy and absolutely loved it there," said Krohn's daughter Suzanne Haykal. "She felt appreciated at the Academy and like she was contributing to something. She was there when Rabbi Meir and Mrs. Regina Belsky were there, and she just adored both of them."

In the 1960s, Krohn had to leave the job she loved at the MHA to care for a sick family member. "She wouldn't have stopped work-

ing at the Academy had she not been needed at home," said Haykal, who lives in the Memphis suburb of Germantown. "She especially loved the Shabbos parties the school had on Fridays."

Considered the emotional anchor of her family, Krohn is best remembered for her unconditional love and generosity. Always thinking of others, the Krohns were active in community service throughout their lives. They volunteered together at various Memphis-area organizations, including the Alzheimer's Day Services on Hickory Hill Road, where for 25 years they worked to help people suffering from the debilitating disease live with dignity and respect.

The MHA/FYOS family sends its condolences to Krohn's four daughters — Haykal, Elizabeth Ragen of Michigan, Jeannette Krohn of Arkansas, and Cindy Dockery of Georgia — as well as her 10 grandchildren and four greatgrandchildren. May her memory be a blessing.

IN LOVING MEMORY OF Rabbi Nechemiah Kibel, z'tl

In the 1969 MHA/YOS high school yearbook, the classmates of **Harry (Nechemiah) Kibel** (MHA '65, YOS '69) wrote of him, "We are confident that he will make himself known as a leader wherever he goes." Their prediction was indeed correct; while many esteemed alumni emerged from the graduating classes of 1965-1970, few left as indelible a mark on the school and the Jewish world at large as the late Rabbi Kibel.

Born in Memphis in 1952 to Holocaust survivors Moshe and Helen Kibel, Nechemiah attended the MHA and YOS through 12th grade. A studious and thoughtful young man, Kibel received awards for excelling in both general and Torah subjects. An essay Kibel composed as a teenager about protecting himself from the temptations of sin reflects that his levels of scholarship and spirituality were far beyond his years:

They say a fool is one who makes the same mistake twice. Then I must be the king of fools. I have not done it twice, but hundreds upon hundreds of times... Each time I refuse to be caught in the trap again. For a few days, I will succeed, but by then my memory will have become dim. I will start to rationalize. Before I know it, it will have slipped and fallen, and once again the cycle will start... I must never remove my training wheels.

In his senior yearbook, Kibel's classmates wrote about him:

Always interested and willing to try



has contributed much to his school and class. His strength... provided the hard core of stability for the Yeshiva as it grew. His religious zeal and commitment to diligent Torah learning

were the standard-setters for the entire Yeshiva.

After graduation, his dedication to Jewish observance and intense Torah study continued to grow as he learned under the tutelage of Rabbi Meir Belsky, who moved to Memphis from New York in the early 1960s to head the MHA. At the age of 20, Rabbi Kibel began his lifelong career as an educator, teaching in the new boys' and girls' high schools. Together

with Rabbi Belsky, Rabbi Kibel helped to build the YOS into a renowned institution of Torah learning that attracted students from near and far.

Also at the age of 20, Rabbi Kibel married **Ranelle Evensky** (MHA '66, YOS '70), to whom he would be married for 33 years. Together they built a large, beautiful family.

Rabbi Kibel's pedagogical philosophy focused not just on teaching young people about Judaism, but also how to love Judaism. "Curriculum is important, but reaching a student's neshama [soul] is what Torah is all about," he told Rayonos magazine in the '90s. Rabbi Kibel's students remember his unique ability to reach their hearts by relating to them on their level, rather than as an authority figure.

One MHAYOS alumna recalled how Rabbi Kibel helped restore her faith in G-d after she experienced a horrific car accident, followed by an extensive hospitalization and several surgeries. "Step by step, Rabbi Kibel slowly led me back into a relationship with Hashem," she said. "Ultimately, my faith was even stronger after the accident than it was before. I owe my life, both physical and spiritual, to Rabbi Kibel, zt'l." This alumna is now a Torah educator herself, teaching in several Israeli seminaries.

Rabbi Kibel transitioned into an administrator role in the 1980s, serving as Judaic studies principal and executive director of the school in partnership with General Studies Principal Dr. Jerry Kutliroff. One of Rabbi Kibel's former students recalled, "We all remember the feeling of being sent to the principal's office for disciplinary action. I was once sent to Rabbi Kibel's office, but I turned out to be lucky, as this was no ordinary principal's office. He decided then to learn *Mesilas Yesharim* ["Path of the Just" by Rabbi Moshe Chaim Luzzatto, a famous text on ethics and character-building] with me, and our daily learning together lasted for a long time."

In 1989, Memphis' loss was Ohio's gain; the Kibels moved to Cincinnati, where they played a major role in founding the Regional Institute

for Torah and Secular Studies (RITSS), a girls' high school with boarding facilities. They were also fixtures in the Cincinnati Community Kollel. Through those institutions, the Kibels influenced the lives of hundreds of students in Cincinnati and beyond.

Rabbi Kibel's life was tragically cut short by a rare form of lymphoma. After months of aggressive treatments — during which he courageously maintained his routine of thricedaily prayer and regular Torah study — Rabbi Kibel passed away Nov. 20, 2005, at the age of 53. His legacy as a gifted educator, scholar and community leader

lives on through his children and grandchildren and the thousands of people whose lives he changed for the better.

"The world is not quite the same without Rabbi Kibel in it," said former student **Pace Cooper** (MHA '77, YOS '81) at a Cincinnati tribute dinner in his teacher's honor shortly after his passing. "The void is palpable, pronounced and very noticeable. How I wish I

could call and speak to Rabbi Kibel, to enjoy his warmth, his inspiration, and of course, his indelible humor.

"And yet, unlike others who are taken from us and sometimes forgotten, his mark and

> his image are fresh in our hearts and will be prevalent in all that we do forever. That was Rabbi Nechemiah Kibel — someone who changed each of us for the better, whose inspiration allowed us to make permanent and ever-growing strides as inspired, committed and Torah-loving Jews. All those touched by Rabbi Kibel will never forget his greatness and the

impact he continues to have in our lives."

But somehow, my father, zt'l, would sneak me a bag of potato chips, which I would share with **Zevi Wolmark** [MHA '69] as we clandestinely indulged while hiding at the back of the bus."

Like so many MHA/FYOS alumni, his favorite teacher was "hands down, my father, Rabbi Efraim Greenblatt, zt'l," and not just because he snuck him potato chips. His message to the Memphis Jewish community: "Please keep chinuch [Jewish education] at the pinnacle of your priorities. Without the MHA, Memphis would never have thrived as a leading Jewish community." Rabbi Greenblatt hopes his classmates are "all living fulfilling and productive lives. 
