

Planting for the future: a 75-year legacy of growth, community and continuity

Dear MHA/FYOS alumni and friends,



When I first came to the school to tour the campus and meet students, I was handed a rather heavy logoed tote bag filled with school swag and pamphlets. After seeing the school's beautiful *beit midrash* and sleek basketball court, cutting-edge STEAM

center and the annual third grade Purim play, I had

a chance to catch my breath and look more carefully at the recent issues of the alumni newsletter. I was impressed by the pages and pages of stories and memories, pictures and mazel tovs, trivia and flashbacks.

I dove in deeper on the flight home, read the wonderful articles,

and saw the "old school cool" vintage pictures of sports teams (I vote to bring back those jerseys!). One image really stood out: It was a picture of 1984 PTA leaders Dotty z'l and Pearl Katz, z'l, planting a tree on what looked like barren soil right at the front edge of campus on White Station. They wanted to "plan for the future by planting" the tree "to be a living testimonial to all the beauty of Yiddishkeit unfolding within the school." (The photo is featured on page 40 of issue 25.) I can see that tree now towering over the main entrance to the school—it's over 75 feet tall! The small gesture by the Katz sisters-in-law now provides an enduring, welcoming signal in front of the school.

You can't look at that image and not think of another great planter — our own Johnny Appleseed — reported to us by Choni Hameagel. The *Gemara* in *Taanis* (23a) recounts:

לההוא חזייה באורחא אזל הוה חד ומא האי ליה אמר חרובא נטע דהוה גברא שבעין עד ליה אמר טעין שנין כמה עד שבעין דחיית לך פשיטא ליה אמר שנין בחרובא עלמא גברא האי ליה אמר שנין שתלי אבהתי לי דשתלי היכי כי אשכחתיה לבראי נמי

He would not live to see the fruits of his labor, yet he planted the tree with future generations in mind.

One day, as he walked along the road, Choni saw a man planting a carob tree. Choni asked him, "How many years will it take for this tree to bear fruit?" The man replied, "It will not produce fruit until 70 years have passed." Choni

then questioned him, "Are you certain that you will live 70 years to enjoy the fruit of this tree?" The man responded, "I was born into a world full of carob trees because my ancestors planted them for me. Just as they did, I am planting this tree for my descendants."

The famous story of Choni Hameagel and the man planting the carob tree is a profound illustration of forward-thinking and selflessness. The man knew he would not live to see the fruits of his labor, yet he planted the tree with future generations in mind. This act reflects a deep understanding that we, as part of a *mesorah* (tradition), and as part of the

story of this Jewish institution, benefit from the teachers, lay leaders, alumni and patrons before us. Importantly, it's a reminder that we must also contribute to the well-being of those who come after us.

Dotty and Pearl Katz's decision to plant a tree in front of the MHA/FYOS was an act of faith and hope for the future. At the time, the soil looked completely bare, much like the carob tree's soil in Choni's story. Yet, these ladies envisioned a future where their small act would grow and flourish, providing beauty and a welcoming presence at the school's entrance. Their act of planting was not just about the physical tree, but about investing in a future they believed in — a testament to the unfolding beauty of Jewish education within the school.

This sentiment is echoed in the *Midrash Tanchuma* from *Parshat Kedoshim* (Chapter 8), which urges diligence in planting even when our land appears to be flourishing:

טוב כל מליאה אותה שתמצאו פ"אע זהירין הוו אלא נטע ולא נשב תאמרו לא מאכל עץ כל ונטעתם שנאמר בנטיעות שנטעו נטיעות ומצאתם שנכנסתם כשם לבניכם נוטעים היו אתם אף אחרים

Even if you find the land abundant with good things, do not say, "We will sit and not plant"; instead, be diligent in planting! As it is written, "You shall plant trees for food" (Vayikra 19:23). Just as you found trees planted by others when you arrived, you must also plant for your children.

The Midrash teaches us that we should not rest on the laurels of the past but continue to contribute to the future. It emphasizes that just as we benefit from the infrastructure, institutions and investments planted by others, we too must do the hard work for future generations. It is my hope that in this pivotal year, and at a time of great celebration of the 75 years of our school's contributions to the Memphis community and Jewish world at-large, we plant the seeds for future generations. There is so much in this edition of the alumni newsletter (and, of course, on campus) that is *melea kol tov*, full of goodness. But we also know that now is the time to sow seeds, nurture the soil, and cultivate growth at the MHA/FYOS.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear MHA/FYOS alumni and friends:



As the father of two alumnae — **Ruthie** (MHA '17, FYOS '21) and **Shoshanah** (MHA '20, FYOS '24) — and one current MHA student, Miriam, I am grateful for the opportunity to serve as president of the school's board of trustees.

In Sefer Bamidbar, we read about many challenges to leadership. Bnei Yisrael (the Jewish people) repeatedly anger Hashem and threaten Moshe and Aharon. The spies rile up the people against the plans for conquest of the land of Israel. Korach, as well as Datan and Aviram, rebel against the leadership. The people are attacked by Edom, Canaan, Amalek and Moab. Hostages are taken. Moabite women and the idolatry of Baal Peor seduce the men of Israel. Many thousands die from plagues. Times are not always easy. Going through the desert can be tough.

But in *Parshat Pinchas*, we turn the page as we read about the leadership transition that occurs when Pinchas receives Hashem's covenant of eternal priesthood and Yehoshua gets the *semicha* of successorship from Moshe. The Sfat Emet finds that the deeper significance of the transition is hidden in a small phrase in the account of the *korban tamid* that follows Yehoshua's *semicha*: עֹלֻת תָּמֶיד הָעֲשֻיָה ("This is the regular burnt offering instituted at Mount Sinai").

This phrase is puzzling. The narrative is approaching the end of *Bnei Yisrael*'s 40 years of wandering in the desert. Almost no one is still alive who was present for the giving of the Torah at *Har Sinai*. Is this the most logical time for them to receive

instructions on offering the daily sacrifice? Why is the daily *korban* characterized as the continuation of a one-off event at Sinai that almost no one hearing these instructions had directly experienced?

For the Sfat Emet, at least, the message is clear. In the generation of Moshe and Aharon, the leadership had a direct connection to the source of the Torah, to the emanation and overflow from Hashem. Moshe and Aharon's very presence provided the people with their spiritual connection to Hashem. A daily *korban* and its detailed policies and procedures weren't needed and would have appeared superfluous in that generation, when leadership came from above.

However, with the generational change, the model of leadership had to change as *Bnei Yisrael*'s way of life evolved and changed. One generation removed from the founders of the nation, leadership arose from below. It became necessary to inspire with a *Torah sheba'al peh* (Oral Torah) connected to the origin at Sinai. It had to empower people to take action, as Pinchas had done and Yehoshua would have to do, while also establishing policies and working procedures to create continuity across generations. The transition to the leadership of Pinchas and Yehoshua marks the turning of a page, to the new leadership that would unite *Bnei Yisrael* in their conquest of the holy land.

As we begin the 75th year of MHA/FYOS educating the children of the Memphis Jewish community, we, too, are experiencing a leadership transition in welcoming Rabbi Dr. Gavriel Brown as our new head of school. While it would be presumptuous to say that our leaders are a Pinchas or a Yehoshua, it is already apparent that Rabbi Brown brings to us the hitorerrut and asiyah — inspiration and empowered

activity — that the Sfat Emet calls for in new leadership.

Among our goals for this year are to celebrate our 75th anniversary by connecting with memories of our school's founders — in part through the dedication of a *Sefer Torah* to the memory of Rav Nota Greenblatt, z'l, our very own link to Sinai. We hope to continue recognizing the many generations of Memphis families who have sustained and built our school over the decades. We seek to prepare for our school's future through united efforts to create a framework for continued growth and improvement. We also want to hear from you, our graduates from the past 75 years, on how you want to celebrate this milestone year for our beloved school.

In her book on *Sefer Bamidbar*, Dr. Erica Brown — noted author, professor and mother of our own Rabbi Dr. Gavriel Brown — writes about the turning point that *Parshat Pinchas* represents:

After Mosaic leadership broke down, it was slowly rebuilt with a different two-way understanding. He reestablished trust with the people by questioning their requests, acquiescing when able, and securing commitment through a reassessment of the power of language. ... Flexibility, accountability and perspective all melded into the reestablishment of trust. Trust allowed then and allows now a renewed.

commitment to a shared picture of a collective future.

Our shared picture of our collective future is encapsulated by the mission statement of the MHA/FYOS: "We promote excellence in Judaic and general studies for both girls and boys. Our school is committed to Torah learning and Torah living, and love of G-d, the Jewish people and the State of Israel." Our objective is to be an institution of choice — one that our children and grandchildren want to attend, that you are proud to be associated with and whose values attract families to our Memphis community.

One small step toward realizing this objective is through our expressions of gratitude. Thank you to our many alumni from near and far who stay engaged with the school through this publication, as well as by volunteering and providing financial support. We greatly value your ongoing care, concern and love for the MHA/FYOS.

On behalf of the school, I offer you and your families wishes of a *shana tova u'metukah* – a good, sweet new year.

What Do You Pray For?

If you found an ancient lamp, rubbed it, and a genie appeared, granting you three wishes, what would you ask for? I imagine most of us would first think of asking for material wealth in some form, and then perhaps ask for something more universal and impactful, like world peace.

We have a similar situation this time of year as we approach Rosh Hashanah. The Rambam (Hilchos Teshuva 2:6, based on the Gemara in Rosh Hashanah 18a) tells us that the posuk (verse) from Sefer Yeshayahu (Isaiah 55:6) — "Dirshu Hashem b'hemotzo (Seek Hashem when He is found)" — refers to the days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. During this time in particular, G-d can grant any wish and is ready and waiting to hear our repentance and prayers.

So, what do we ask for? We look to *Chazal* (our sages) to guide our prayers. The prayers of Rosh Hashanah concentrate on our yearning for the day when Hashem will be recognized as King for all mankind. True, this is our hope as a nation, and we all yearn for the day when *Mashiach* (messiah) will come. But, what about each of our individual prayers?

There is one notable point in our prayers when we do use the first person. The prayer starts, "Ribono Shel Olam – Master of the Universe, fulfill my requests for good." It comes at a very holy time in the service, when the aron kodesh (holy ark) is open and we are about to read from the Torah. We introduce the prayer by reciting the 13 attributes of G-d, "Hashem, Hashem ...," three times. Through

a covenant with Moshe (Moses), G-d promised that whenever the Jewish people recite the 13 attributes, their prayers will be answered.

There are two versions of this prayer. On the *Yomim Noraim* (High Holidays), when our fate for the entire year is at stake, we beseech G-d: "Forgive my sins. ... Remember me for long life ... good livelihood ... bread to eat ... clothing to wear." These are material requests for the coming year.

The other version of the *Ribono Shel Olam* prayer, which is recited on the *Shalosh Regalim* (the holidays of Sukkot, Pesach and Shavuot — times of communion with Hashem), is completely focused on the spiritual. We beseech G-d, "Rescue me and my family from the evil inclination and grant our share in Torah. ... Privilege us that You may rest Your presence on us."

In a Yom Tov drasha (holiday sermon) given many years ago at the Academy, Rav Nota Greenblatt, z'l, pointed out that the words in the prayer for the Shalosh Regalim really are unbelievable. This level of closeness to G-d, described as hashroas haShechina, has been attained only by tzadikim (righteous people) like the great prophets, and yet here every single Jew prays for such closeness? What's more, the next part of the prayer is even more perplexing: "Let there be fulfilled in us the verse, 'The spirit of Hashem shall rest upon him, the spirit of wisdom.'" This is the prophecy of Yeshaya (Isaiah) referring to Mashiach, who will attain the closest heavenly relationship possible. Yet here, we are praying to reach the same level as Mashiach?

D'VAR TORAH Rabbi Larry Katz (MHA '67)

As Rav Nota explained, we see from this prayer that the simplest Jew, even a sinner, shouldn't be discouraged by their current spiritual level. Rather, every Jew should realize that they have inside of themselves a piece of G-d called the *neshama* (soul). That enables them to reconnect to their Source and plead to G-d to grant them the highest level possible to attain.

Rav Nota taught us that we must always set high spiritual goals for ourselves. Even if we don't always reach them for whatever reason, we still gain because we are orienting ourselves upward. This is similar to archery. When shooting an arrow at a target, the archer must aim the bow higher than the target to account for the pull of gravity and the friction slowing the arrow down. When our focus is elevated, we are more likely to hit the target.

The reason given for the material requests included in the *Ribono Shel Olam* prayer for the *Yomim Noraim* is "in order to be engaged in Your Torah and *mitzvos* (commandments)." Our material requests are not for self-gratification, but rather so we can be healthy and free to pursue the goals of the soul. The two versions of the prayer are actually related: We should pray for a long life, health and livelihood, and we should keep in mind that the ultimate goal is to come closer to Hashem by learning Torah and observing the *mitzvos*.

May it be the will of Hashem to inspire us to aim ever higher on our spiritual journey, and may all of our individual and communal prayers be answered for good. May we have peace in Israel, and may we merit for the Divine Presence to rest upon us once again with the coming of *Mashiach*.

How three boys from Jacksonville, Florida, found their way to the MHA

In 1965, Etz Chaim Synagogue, a small Orthodox congregation in Jacksonville, Florida, received word that a Yeshiva high school was opening in Memphis, Tennessee — the first of its kind in the South. The synagogue's spiritual leader at that time was a young Rabbi Eliyahu Hartman (a name very familiar to many of our alumni).

Three young members of the congregation had recently celebrated their b'nai mitzvah: Jan Starr, Marc Kauss and Herbert Schild (all MHA '66). They each excelled in their Torah studies, and Rabbi Hartman recognized the importance of these three young men receiving an immersive Jewish education. However, none of the families were in a financial position to cover day school tuition and living expenses for their sons. Undeterred, Rabbi Hartman raised money from his congregation to enable the boys to attend school in Memphis.

It was quite difficult for 13 year olds to venture so far from home, especially at a time when this was not commonplace. They could not afford plane tickets to Memphis, so they traveled overnight

by bus — even switching buses at 2 a.m. Their commitment is a testament to their love of Torah and deep desire to attend yeshiva.

"We lived upstairs in Rabbi Gershon Weinrib's home, a two-story house on Rosebud Lane, one block from Rabbi Chaim Seiger's house," Starr said. "We ate nearly all our meals at the Seiger home."

Rabbi Hartman was very pleased with how the Jacksonville-Memphis program worked out. However, it only lasted one year; Rabbi Hartman then left Jacksonville to come and teach at our school, ultimately becoming the principal. (For more on Rabbi Hartman, see the Spotlight feature in our <u>19th issue</u>, page 25).

"The MHA and Memphis will always hold a special place in my heart," Starr said. "The people, the community, the Academy — so much has stuck with me, 60 years later."

Starr still has his MHA yearbook from 1966. "Looking at it," he noted, "always makes me smile."



She is thankful for the wonderful friends she made during her MHA/YOS days. Her favorite teacher was Mrs. Phyllis Wahl, z'l.





Rabbi Yosef and Mrs. Maxine Rottenberg

Bringing the dream of Torah inspiration to MHA



Anyone who has ever questioned whether a few years in a community can make a meaningful difference need look no further than Rabbi Yosef and Mrs. Maxine Rottenberg. These inspirational leaders, now renowned as Torah scholars with four decades of service to Jewish institutions of Baltimore, spent three early years of their marriage teaching at the MHA. In the process, they left an indelible mark on many students in Memphis and forged relationships that would last a lifetime.

Rabbi Rottenberg was born in Hungary before the outbreak of World War II. He and his parents were able to escape from the Nazis in 1944, thanks to U.S. papers his grandfather secured during a failed attempt to make a living in America in the 1880s. The family settled in New York; there, he attended prominent yeshivas and was introduced to Maxine, a native Baltimorean attending Stern College who would become his wife.

At age 25, he became a student of Torah giant Rabbi Moshe Feinstein, z'l, to become proficient in halacha (Jewish law) and how to pasken shailos (answer questions on matters of Jewish law). One area of study he delved into with Rabbi Feinstein was gittin (writs of Jewish divorce), and that was how he met Memphis's own Rabbi Nota Greenblatt, z'l, in New York.

"R' Nota Greenblatt was in New York and needed a witness for a *get*," Rabbi Rottenberg told Where What When, a Baltimore Jewish publication, in 2014. "I was studying *gittin*, so I went along with him. I started speaking to the man. I never met anyone like that before. He knew everything! ... He was one of the greatest halachic authorities of our generation ... and he was a *mensch*, such a wonderful person."

At the time expecting their first child, the Rottenbergs were exploring income sources beyond his *kollel* studies with Rabbi Feinstein. Rav

Nota enticed Rabbi Rottenberg with a teaching opportunity at the MHA. "I immediately said yes," he told Where What When. "Just to be in the same city [as Rav Nota] was enough for me." Since another position he'd been considering was at a shul in Singapore, Mrs. Rottenberg was relieved they would only be traveling as far as Memphis.

The Rottenbergs began their tenure as members of the MHA faculty in 1965 and immediately connected with their students.

"Rabbi Rottenberg was my Gemara *rebbe* in eighth grade," said **Rabbi Joel Yormark** (MHA '66, YOS '69). "I have very fond memories of his warmth and the style in which he taught us how to learn Gemara."

"Rabbi Rottenberg inspired me with his enthusiasm and love for learning Gemara," said **Rabbi Larry Katz** (MHA '67). "When Rav Moshe Feinstein, z'l, came to Memphis for the dedication of the Yeshiva of the South, Rabbi Rottenberg took me by the hand and brought me up to Rav Moshe for him to give me a personal *bracha* (blessing). Though Rabbi Rottenberg was my seventh and eighth grade *rebbe* over 55 years ago, I am forever grateful to him and very happy to now have the opportunity to thank him after all these years."

"He was smart and an outstanding teacher," said **Avraham (Barry) Nelkin** (MHA '66) of Rabbi Rottenberg. "I remember him as a 'tough' *rebbe*. I can still picture him in his dark suit and long beard. It was so difficult for me coming from a public school, but Rabbi Rottenberg made learning Hebrew easy, even though I had to work hard. He gave me, and every other student, very personal attention. I think of him often."

"I remember morning davening with Mrs. Rottenberg, and specifically reciting *Hallel* on special occasions," said **Karen (Katz) Rubenstein** (MHA '69, YOS '72). "I still use the same tunes she taught us for Hallel and think of her each time I say it."

Beyond the walls of MHA's classrooms, Rabbi and Mrs. Rottenberg forged special bonds with many members of the Memphis community, bringing Torah inspiration with them.

"The Rottenbergs lived in the same apartment complex as my family," recalled **Brenda** (Silverman) Pritzker (MHA '70, YOS '74). "My father, z'l, and the rabbi were very good friends and spent a good deal of time learning together."

During their time at MHA, the Rottenbergs grew to be a family of four, with sons Yisroel and Meir born in Memphis. (They later had four other children: Moshe, Hennie, Nissi and Chaim.) As a young mother, Mrs. Rottenberg grew homesick for her native Maryland. After three years of dedicated service in Memphis, the Rottenbergs decided to relocate to Baltimore to be closer to her family.

There, Mrs. Rottenberg taught at a kindergarten for several years and later worked at the famed kosher grocer Seven Mile Market. Rabbi Rottenberg became a 12th grade *rebbe* at Talmudical Academy (TA), a position he held for nearly 40 years! Toward the end of his tenure, he was elevated to the position of *rosh yeshiva*.

Due to the breadth of his scholarship and extensive training under Rabbi Feinstein, Rav Nota and other Torah luminaries, Rabbi Rottenberg was also widely sought after for his knowledge of *halacha*.

"Though my class at MHA did not have Rabbi Rottenberg as a teacher, I have a unique memory of him," said Sam Finkelstein (MHA '70). "After we graduated high school from Ner Israel in Baltimore, Berish Kipper (MHA '70) and I, along with three friends, learned with Rabbi Moshe Heinemann (our 12th grade rebbe, who was very close to Rav Nota) at his home every Saturday night. During our learning, he would get phone calls and his wife would answer. If it was really important, such as questions of life and death, Rav Heinemann — who was and is well known for his ability to pasken shailos — would answer. He often received calls from Rabbi Rottenberg, who had moved to Baltimore. Very often, his shailos involved issues Ray Heinemann had to answer then and there. We heard Rav Heinemann's side of the call, and he would share many of the shailos with us. We couldn't wait for a Rabbi Rottenberg call! We realized Rabbi Rottenberg was a gadol b'Yisrael (great man among the Jewish people) who was involved with high-level issues for the Baltimore community and beyond. Rav Heinemann had the highest respect for Rabbi Rottenberg, who was known far and wide for his ability to help people with their shailos."

Long after leaving the MHA, the Rottenbergs kept in close contact with friends they'd made in Memphis, including the Cohns, Greenblatts and Kutners. They shared in each other's family simchas for many years.

Now with six grown children (including two who followed in their father's footsteps and work as 12th grade *rebbeim*) and many grandchildren and great-grandchildren, the Rottenbergs continue to make their home in Baltimore. Regrettably, Rabbi






